

Bridging Silicon Valley to the campus High Tech Connections

Organized by the US
ambassador and the Dutch
minister of trade, a group
of key representatives of
industrial companies
located in the Netherlands
visited Silicon Valley and
some of its companies.
The purpose for this trade
mission was to place
Europe, and in particular
the Netherlands, on the
map for new technology
investments.

High Tech Connections, a unique trade forum, was held in Silicon Valley, USA, from 11 to 13 January. It featured leaders from business, academia and government and capitalized on the drive for innovation that is underway in the Netherlands. It should help US and Dutch companies, universities and institutes, involved in high technology to create opportunities for new business matchmaking and technological exchanges.

Philips was represented among others by CEO Gerard Kleisterlee, Rick Harwig (CEO Research), Henk van Houten (programme manager Lighting, Devices & Microsystems), Hans Feil (business development manager MiPlaza) and Jerome Verhagen (campus site manager). Other companies present included ASML, FEI, Atos Origin, IBM, Intel, Oracle, Cisco, Cap Gemini and HP.

Netherlands, with its high level of technology expertise that US companies are looking for. Rick Harwig gave a presentation in the Embedded Systems session and Henk van Houten in the Nanotechnology session.

There was also a special seminar to promote the campus. A number of high-tech business models that are winners for Europe were presented. The key issue was how to take advantage of Philips' knowledge and networks as well as that of the region to promote innovation and European marketing and sales. The expectations of the MiPlaza (Microsystems Plaza) concept was propagated, and companies and institutes were asked to consider settling on the campus.

The mayor of Eindhoven played an active role during this trade forum. He announced to the press that he will stimulate public/private cooperation on the campus.
